Snapshot of Human Rights in Haiti Following the Earthquake

Prepared for March 23, 2010 hearing before the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights

Housing

- ➤ 1.3 million people are living in spontaneous settlement sites.¹
- > 56% of the need for emergency shelter has been met through the distribution of over 35,000 family size tents and over 259,266 tarps.²
- ➤ 157 of the 326 settlements risk flooding and landslides in the coming rainy season.³
- ➤ 200,000 people in high-risk settlement camps need 600 hectares of land for resettlement.

 The Government has so far identified 220 hectares.⁴
- ▶ 604,215 people have left Port-au-Prince for outlying communities. Displacement to rural areas has caused increases in household size, ranging from 40% (in the Sud-Est, Centre and Artibonite departments) to over 120% (in the Nippes and Grand Anse departments). 5
- Approximately 160,000 displaced persons are living with families near the Dominican boarder.⁶

Water and Sanitation

- ➤ 1.2 million people are receiving daily water distributions.
- ➤ In mid-February 52% of 133 settlement camps surveyed had no excreta disposal system in place.⁸

Humanitarian responders hope to provide 12,950 latrines before end of March and 21,000 before the end of June. If this goal is met, settlement camps will be equipped with 1 latrine for every 50 people. 10

- In mid-February, approximately 54% of displaced families had not received hygiene kits.

 Humanitarian responders have distributed 88,000 hygiene kits, reaching 510,000 people meeting approximately 46% of the target 1 of providing 1 hygiene kit for each family. 12
- ➤ UNDP's cash-for-work programme is employing 70,610 people to clear garbage and refuse. ¹³

Food

- ➤ 4.3 million people have received food aid from the World Food Programme ("WFP"),¹⁴ 350,000 of whom are living outside of Port-au-Prince.¹⁵
- Approximately 13,000 people in Port-au-Prince have not received any food assistance.¹⁶
- ➤ Malnutrition levels are below emergency thresholds¹¹ but distribution efforts must double to meet current need.

Current resources can meet approximately 60% of the acute malnutrition treatment need. 18

- There is a need for a sustainable cooking fuel alternative to charcoal and wood.¹⁹
- ➤ Imported rice and wheat flower prices increased 25% and 65% respectively since the earthquake.²⁰
- President Préval has asked international partners to stop food assistance and focus on agriculture production because food assistance is interfering with and competing with Haitian markets. ²¹

Agriculture

- The agriculture sector was severely under-funded through the UN Flash Appeal.

 By mid-February, the appeal was fully funded for \$562 million but sector allocations did not meet the need identified by the appeal.²²
- ➤ The March planting season provides 60% of local food production.²³
- Commercial agricultural suppliers suffered damages or have stopped selling their products, causing a shortage of needed inputs for the March planting season.²⁴
- > Stress on host communities from displacement is reducing the ability of households to purchase agricultural inputs leading to collapse of agricultural markets.

Displacement is leading to extreme coping strategies including the consumption of food reserves, eating seeds, use of household cash savings and assets stripping.²⁵

The Ministry of Agriculture recommends shipping in certified and locally adapted seed varieties as part of immediate relief efforts for March.

The Ministry produced a list of available certified seed varieties.²⁶

- ➤ Sufficient quantities of local seeds may still be available in local markets.²⁷
- Reduced demand in traditional markets is damaging agricultural household income. Farmers reported that they were unable to sell their produce in local markets.²⁸

Women

- There were 35,000 pregnant women at the time of the quake.²⁹
- Approximately 197,480 pregnant or lactating women were affected by the quake.³⁰
- ➤ Women are victims of coercive transactional sex, trafficking, and sexual exploitation and abuse.

7 hospitals and 2 NGOs are working with trafficking and abuse victims.³¹ Women's safety when traveling to and from food distribution sites is a concern.³²

- Women have been reluctant to report rapes.³³
- The poor sanitary conditions are causing women to suffer urinary tract and vaginal infections.³⁴

Humanitarian responders are meeting with women's groups to determine needs concerning women's right to water, hygiene, health, food, education, and adequate standard of living.³⁵

A consultation was held on March 9th with 50 women's organizations and the Ministry of Women in Port-au-Prince.³⁶

Children

- ➤ 1.26 million children have been directly or indirectly affected by the earthquake, 700,000 of whom are 6 to 12 years old.³⁷
- ➤ 450,000 children have been displaced.³⁸
- ➤ 250 separated children have been confirmed; 15 are benefitting from interim family care arrangements.³⁹
- As of mid-February, community mobilization and education had provided counseling for 7,828 caregivers. 40
- At least 1,165 mothers and infants have participated in baby-friendly feeding tents within the camps in Port-au-Prince.⁴¹
- As of mid-February 2.9 million children were not attending classes.

Unaffected schools outside Port-au-Prince reopened on February 1st. Within Port-au-Prince, schools have not reopened due to concerns over structural integrity, but classes are scheduled to begin in temporary structures if necessary in April. 42
