

Give Detainees Their Day in Court



The **Health and Human Rights in Prisons Project (HHRPP)** provides legal and medical relief for prisoners held unjustly in some of the world's worst prison conditions, while advancing systemic reform of Haiti's criminal justice and prison systems. HHRPP is a collaboration among IJDH, BAI, Partners in Health, and PIH's Haitian affiliate *Zanmi Lasante*.

Successes in 2012 include:

Freeing 74 unjustly held prisoners and providing legal and medical services to hundreds more; dropping the rate for pretrial detention at all three sites where we work below 50%—the national rate exceeds 90%; and successfully advocating for the UN Human Rights Council to issue recommendations for an improved pretrial detention policy.

Help Reunify Haitian Families Before the Next Holiday Season



The **Haitian Family Reunification Parole Program (HFRPP)** would eliminate the waiting list currently preventing 110,000 Haitians already *approved* for immigration to the U.S. from joining their families. IJDH helps Haitian-American groups and allies organize, works to secure partners among national, state and local officials, and coordinates a media campaign.

Train the Next Generation of Human Rights Lawyers



BAI's **Legal Training Programs** are creating a corps of trained, motivated public interest lawyers in Haiti through a combination of formal training by Haitian and international experts and on-the-job skill development through supervised work on BAI cases. BAI alumni have brought this training to influential positions in Haiti's ministries, judicial system and human rights community.

IJDH and BAI keep our costs low by relying on a dedicated network of volunteers. We are very grateful to the design team— Dan Wong, Natasha Marcano, Sebastian Llano, Norali Zamora, and Juan Vargas— from the New York City College of Technology, CUNY, who have been designing a new look for the organization, and redesigning the website. 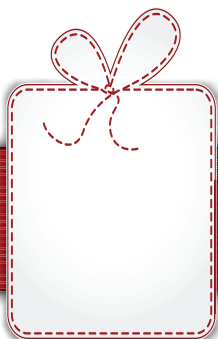

Give Haitian Women Security and Equality



The **Rape Accountability and Prevention Project (RAPP)** empowers Haitian women and reduces sexual assault by pushing rape cases through the courts and training grassroots women's groups to fight for their rights in courts, on the streets and in the media.

Successes in 2012 include:

Convictions in our first 4 trials this summer, with 14 more coming up; two Haitian women lawyers specializing in rape cases; and grassroots women's groups led press conferences, organized trial observation program and engaged international human rights mechanisms.

Stand with Cholera Victims in the Fight for Justice



The **Cholera Accountability Project (CAP)** pursues a claim on behalf of 5,000 victims of the cholera introduced to Haiti by UN Peacekeepers, seeking: 1) provision of the water and sanitation infrastructure necessary to control the epidemic, 2) compensation for the victims' losses, and 3) an apology. The project leverages a modest investment in legal work to obtain hundreds of millions of dollars in water and sanitation investments that would save an estimated 4,000 lives per year.

Successes in 2012 include:

Securing the collaboration of influential decision-makers, including 106 members of the US Congress, who have written a letter calling for a more just UN response to cholera; exerting substantial media pressure, including supportive editorials in the *New York Times* and *Boston Globe*, positive coverage on television, radio and print media throughout the world, and an award-winning short documentary *Baseball in the Time of Cholera*; and UN Special Envoy Bill Clinton conceded that the UN troops were the "proximate cause" of the cholera epidemic.

Give Duvalier's Victims Faith in Justice



The **Jean-Claude Duvalier Prosecution** pursues one of last century's most notorious dictators, and deters government corruption and political violence.

Successes in 2012 include:

Submitting an appeal brief on behalf of the BAI's eight clients, all political prisoners of the Duvalier regime.

Help Displaced Families Enforce Housing Rights



The **Housing Rights Advocacy Project (HRAP)** provides legal support and training to earthquake survivors who are fighting illegal eviction from tent cities, and to grassroots advocates who are fighting for a humane, sustainable housing policy.

Successes in 2012 include:

Successfully advocating for the UN Human Rights Council to issue recommendations for an improved government housing policy; kept housing rights issues on the world's radar screen through media advocacy in Haiti and abroad and several demonstrations in Haiti; and IJDH's report exposing gaps in the Haitian government's displaced persons relocation policy was presented to members of the U.S. Congress and widely reported in the press.
