Duvalier Prosecution

Jean-Claude Duva-lier must not be allowed to evade jus-tice in Haiti

For-mer Hait-ian dictator Jean-Claude "Baby Doc" Duva-lier's case for crimes against humanity is currently up for appeal. BAI and IJDH lawyers are working hard to help a group of survivors and families of victims of torture, ille-gal exe-cu-tions and enforced dis-ap-pear-ances dur-ing Duvalier's time in power (1971–1986) request that the Court over-turn a pre-vi-ous deci-sion not to inves-ti-gate the for-mer leader's alleged respon-si-bil-ity for the crimes due to expiration of statute of limitations. and the New York Times quotes us.

"Inter-na-tional human rights stan-dards are very clear in cases such as this. Crimes includ-ing tor-ture, exe-cu-tions, arbi-trary deten-tion and enforced dis-ap-pear-ances are not sub-ject to a statute of lim-i-ta-tions and the alleged per-pe-tra-tors can-not ben-e-fit from par-dons nor amnesties," said Javier Zúñiga, Spe-cial Advi-sor at Amnesty International, "With the case of Jean Claude Duva-lier, it is the whole cred-i-bil-ity of the Hait-ian jus-tice sys-tem which is at stake. Only by respect-ing the pro-ce-dures in the appeal case . . . will the Court be able to demon-strate the pro-fes-sion-al-ism and inde-pen-dence of the Hait-ian jus-tice sys-tem."

Jean-Claude Duva-lier returned to Haiti from 25 years exile in France in Jan-u-ary 2011. He was then indicted by the Hait-ian author-i-ties for embez-zle-ment, theft of pub-lic funds, and crimes against human-ity – includ-ing tor-ture, exe-cu-tions, arbi-trary deten-tion and enforced dis-ap-pear-ances – carried out between 1971 and 1986.

Cholera

A Step in the Right Direction

Since October 2010, over 8,000 Haitians have been killed by the deadly cholera epidemic that was brought to Haiti by UN troops. With your help, IJDH and BAI are getting justice for the cholera victims.

You and over 28,000 individuals (and counting!) signed a **petition** launched by Oliver Stone calling on UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-Moon to respond justly to the UN's responsibility for the cholera. Our fight for justice was endorsed by the <u>Boston Globe</u>, and recently covered by <u>NPR</u> and the <u>BBC</u>.

Thanks to you, all this pressure is working. On December 11, 2012 Secretary-General Ban announced that the UN would join the \$2.2 billion Cholera Free Hispaniola Initiative, which aims to eliminate cholera through investments in healthcare, public education, and clean water and sanitation infrastructure. The announcement is an important step- if implemented, it will save 4,000 lives per year. But it is only 10% funded. We need to keep applying pressure until poor Haitians are drinking clean water.

Immigration Advocacy

On October 1, 2012, the DHS extended Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for Haitians in the US to July 22, 2014, protecting Haitian nationals who came to the US in the wake of January 2010's devastating earthquake from deportation. Haitians with TPS had two months to re-register, but Hurricane Sandy, which struck in late October, shut down the administrative infrastructure of regions where many Haitians in America reside. Thanks to the collective work of IJDH and a broad range of advocates, US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) announced on December 27, 2012 that they would extend the re-registration period to January 29, 2013. This extension helped many Haitians follow the procedures that allow them to live and work in the United States.
